St. Louis Society for the Blind and Visually Impaired fulfills its vibrant mission each day through programs and services that empower individuals with vision loss to continue participating in the activities that are most important to them and achieve their goals to live safely, confidently and independently.



We help through our low vision clinic that provides functional vision assessments and optical aids so that clients can maximize and best utilize their remaining sight.



We help through rehabilitative therapies that support our clients in developing new skills and adapting their approaches to daily activities.



We provide transportation services for medical appointments and many other daily living needs and activities.



We build knowledge and abilities in the use of new technologies so that our clients can navigate accessibility features on their computers, smart phones, tablets and other devices.



We strengthen our clients' resilience through peer and support groups, recreational activities, and many other opportunities to stay connected to each other and the community.

The Society achieved significant milestones in 2024, including serving more than 1,340 clients, extending the geographic reach of our services in the metro area, and providing 2,428 rides through our transportation services. We completed renovation and expansion of our Drew's Low Vision Clinic, Sight Solutions Shop, and occupational therapy facilities. The year was also one of transition in the Society's leadership, as Laura Park-Leach retired as President and C.E.O. Laura implemented many initiatives during her tenure that have strengthened the Society's programs and services for many years to come.

The Society is a beacon of help and hope every step of the way for individuals in our community who are experiencing the life-changing impact of vision loss. 

Year Ended December 31, 2024




In her own words...

"They addressed my worries of not being able to see or read. It really calmed my fears."





ENRICHING THE PATH TO INDEPENDENCE

I don’t sit at home. Because of the Society, I get around safely and independently. Through their Assistive Technology training, I can now create spreadsheets on my computer.”

EXPANDING SOCIETY'S CAPACITY TO SERVE THE COMMUNITY

The Drews Low Vision Clinic at St. Louis Society for the Blind and Visually Impaired provides functional vision assessments and optical aids to help clients maximize and best utilize their remaining sight. The clinic is staffed by Doctors of Optometry and occupational therapists who specialize in low vision services. With the need for vision rehabilitation services continuing to increase as the population ages, the Society developed plans and secured funding to expand the Drews Low Vision Clinic. The renovation and expansion included many improvements to the site:

- To reduce wait times for clinic appointments with our eye doctors and occupational therapy staff, a second functional vision assessment room and new exam and diagnostic equipment were added.
- Three small storage rooms were converted into one large training center where clients can learn how to use a range of video magnification equipment to assist them with reading, other daily tasks, hobbies or interests and select the equipment that best meets their needs.
- A room dedicated to lighting options was installed so clients can check out the types of lamps and lighting that will work best for them at home or in the workplace.
- Our Sight Solutions Shop moved to a “new home” within the Society’s offices complete with doors and windows. The shop is bright, open and full of items to aid the blind and visually impaired. HELPING OUR CLIENTS GET WHERE THEY NEED TO GO

Access to safe and reliable transportation profoundly impacts the wellbeing of people who are blind or visually impaired. The Society's transportation services address this important need and foster a more inclusive and empowered community for individuals with vision loss.

Our transportation specialists provide rides for our clients Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. to assist with needs such as:

- Medical appointments and other healthcare needs
- Participation in the Society's programs and events
- Grocery shopping
- Financial appointments
- Social engagements with family and friends

Recognizing that clients also have transportation needs in the evenings and on weekends, the Society has expanded options to include reimbursement to clients for rides arranged through taxicabs or ride-share providers. This enhancement to our services was made possible and continues through the generosity of private donations.

CLIENT ENRICHMENT EVENTS

Events such as the Society's Client Picnic in the spring and Holiday Party each winter are among the ways in which our team helps build connections among our clients. The Society also provides many opportunities for clients to enjoy a variety of sports, cultural and artistic experiences. A few are highlighted here:

April 8: Solar Eclipse

Society hosted an eclipse viewing event for our clients. Most of us can depend on our eyes and those special glasses to view such a once in a lifetime event, but for those who are visually impaired or blind, they only hear the excitement of others around them.

What if our clients could hear the eclipse? Thanks to the LightSound Project and the Center for Astrophysics at Harvard University, such a thing was able to happen. The LightSound device was designed and developed in 2017 as a tool for the Blind and Low Vision community to experience a solar eclipse with sound. The device uses a technique called sonification which is the process of converting data (or light intensity) to sound. As the Moon eclipses the Sun during a Solar Eclipse, the sunlight begins to dim and the LightSound device will output a change in musical tone. Society clients were thrilled at having this opportunity to "hear" the eclipse.



The James Butler Award is named in honor of one of Society's founders and is presented to an individual for long meritorious service to Society by active participation on the Board of Directors, significant referral of patients, and a variety of additional agency support. It was the Society's honor to bestow the James Butler Award to Prof. Gillian Roper-Hall and her husband, the late Dr. Stephen Waltman. Prof. Roper-Hall is a member of the Saint Louis University School of Medicine Faculty. Dr. Waltman specialized in cornea transplant surgery and restored sight to thousands of patients. Later in his career, he found great joy in teaching ophthalmology physicians in medical residency at the St. Louis VA Medical Center.

"All charitable organizations accept donations, but not many translate those funds so directly into programs, equipment, and training for their recipients as St. Louis Society for the Blind and Visually Impaired," said Prof. Roper-Hall in receiving the award and sharing what the Society has meant to them and to the patients in their care over the years.

The year was one of transition in executive leadership as Laura Park-Leach retired and Sharon Mertzlufft joined us as the Society's new President and C.E.O.

Since joining the Society in July of 2019, Laura led a number of initiatives that expanded the agency's services and our reach in the community.

Under her guidance, Society expanded the Drews Low Vision Clinic, which now has two exam lanes, dedicated lighting and CCTV rooms, and a much larger Sight Solutions Shop. Society also established an Assistive Technology Center for demonstrating and teaching computers, phones, wearable technology and more. During Laura's tenure, Society extended services to Jefferson County, Missouri and Southwestern Illinois through the utilization of Occupational Therapy Assistants.

For more than 40 years in numerous states, Laura dedicated herself to supporting individuals who are blind or visually impaired, first as an Orientation and Mobility Specialist and later in non-profit leadership roles.

Sharon Mertzlufft brings more than 30 years of experience in the non-profit sector to SLSBVI, most recently having served as vice president and executive director of development and community affairs for St. Luke's Hospital in Chesterfield, Missouri, where her responsibilities included overseeing the health system's philanthropy and volunteer programs, spiritual care services, community outreach initiatives, marketing and communications.

Prior to joining St. Luke's, Sharon directed the \$250 million private fund-raising campaign that was led by the CityArchRiver 2015 Foundation as part of a \$380 million public-private partnership to transform and enhance the Gateway Arch National Park.

Earlier in her career, she worked in leadership roles with the United Way of Greater St. Louis and the Missouri Botanical Garden.
